Important: Christmas holidays notifications

It is not essential to inform us about other positive cases or self-isolation advice during the holidays, although it would be helpful for us to know. If your son or daughter has to self-isolate and will miss the start of next term, please let us know at the start of next term.

Stop Press: start of next term

Whilst I've been finishing this *Update*, news has broken that the "return to secondary school in January will be staggered in England, with some starting online rather than in class" (according to the BBC). Reports suggest that Years 11 and 13 will return as scheduled on 4th January, but as at this point in time (1:30pm on 17th December) I have not received any formal notification about what we are supposed to do.

Update at 2:30pm: latest reports suggest that key workers' children and vulnerable children will also be able to restart on Monday 4th; all other students will restart on Monday 11th. I assume the definition of "key workers" (and of "vulnerable" children) will be the same as last term. **If your**

son or daughter is in Year 7, 8, 9, 10 or 12 and meets either of these sets of criteria, please email scbrierley@stmargaretsacademy.com if you would like them to attend school during the first week of next term.

It would be inappropriate for me to share all my thoughts on this matter; suffice it to say (a) that the Association of School and College Leaders has commented that "it beggars belief that this announcement is being made now", and (b) that we'll be in touch as and when we receive more details. In the meantime, please accept my apologies for the uncertainty, which is (as I'm sure you'll understand) due to circumstances beyond our control.
