Year 9 options

Letters confirming Year 9 students' GCSE options have been mailed out this week and should arrive (in the post) over the next couple of days, if they haven't already. **Please let us know about any problems as soon as possible**. If your son has changed his mind about what he would like to study, we may be able to accommodate the change – but please be aware that some subjects are now quite tight for numbers.

Term dates, 2021/2022

It's recently been confirmed that the next academic year will only comprise 189 school days (excluding INSET days), instead of the usual 190. The reason for this is the extra Bank Holiday that's been given to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The extra Bank Holiday, Friday 3rd June, falls in most schools' half-term week anyway, and it's now been clarified that schools will be able to take an extra day's holiday elsewhere during the school year instead. We have decided to take it on **Monday 6th December**. School will now be closed to students (and staff) that day.

We value your views...

As you'll be aware, we've made a number of changes to school life this year, and now we're planning for next year, we're keen to hear your views about which changes should 'stick'. There are three areas in particular where we'd appreciate your views:

- How should we arrange Parents' Evenings?

 Pre-Covid we invited everyone on site; nowadays we run virtual Parents' Evenings. Which work better for you? or would a hybrid model be best (say: Years 7, 9 and 13 have a physical Parents' Evening, Years 8, 10 and 12 have a virtual one, and Year 11 has one of each)?
- Should students still come into school in their PE kit on days when they have PE? (This is likely to be only one day in the week).
- How often do you want to hear from me? (!)
 Pre-Covid I wrote SMArtTalk once a month. Nowadays we have a weekly Update. Which did you prefer? or would a once-a-fortnight model be the best way forward?

I ask these questions now to promote some discussion; next week we'll have a link to a quick survey for you to give your views. The survey will remain open until Friday 18th June, as it would be unfair to ask Year 10 parents for their views on Parents' Evenings before you've experienced the joys of a virtual event! (Year 10 Parents' Evening will be held on Monday 14th June, as announced in *Update* 55).
