Timings of the Day, September 2021

On the subject of arrangements for next year, you may recall that last term, we consulted with you about changing the times of the school day (see *Coronavirus Update* 47). Thank you to those who responded. Comments received were fed back to the Governors, and the matter was discussed at a (virtual) meeting of the Full Governing Body earlier this week.

As a result of the discussion, the decision was taken to proceed with the plans upon which we previously consulted. This means that the start and finish times for students next year will be:

Year-group	Start time	Finish time	Comment
Year 7	8:30am	2:45pm	On one day each week, students in Key Stage 3
Year 8	8:45am	3:15pm	will finish 45 minutes early. We will confirm
Year 9	9:00am	3:15pm	which day this is before the end of term.
Year 10	9:30am	3:45pm	
Year 11	9:15am	3:30pm	
Year 12	9:00am	2:45pm	Most students will be in school for two full
Year 13	9:30am	3:15pm	days and two shorter days each week.

Apart from the one-day-a-week early finish for Key Stage 3 students, these timings will be the same every day (because we think it is generally better to spread students' learning more evenly over the course of the week).

In the consultation, some parents fed back that 'staggering' the start of the school day in this way can make things difficult if students from the same family want (or need) to travel together. Regrettably we weren't able to alleviate that situation this year. However, because the 'stagger' will be smaller next year, it *may* be possible to help a small number of families in this situation in September (though at this stage, I can't make any promises) – perhaps by offering a supervised room onsite where students can complete homework *etc*. If we are able to do this, places will be prioritised (a) for families where one child has significant additional needs that affect their ability to travel independently, then (b) for families where one child is in Year 7. Again, we'll share more about this later in the term.

I should add that these plans have been drawn up on the assumption that we won't have any Coronavirus restrictions in place next year. If it transpires that we do, we may need to make some adjustments.

Year 8 news

I appreciate that a number of parents were unable to book appointments with all the teachers they may have wished to see at the Year 8 Parents' Evening earlier this month. Please accept my apologies if you weren't able to; we're looking to see how we can adapt the system going forward to reduce this issue. If you didn't get to speak to a teacher and haven't made alternative arrangements to get some feedback yet, please let Mr Gibbons (Head of Year 8) know, and he will help sort things out. - Provide evidence and specialist advice in order to demonstrate to partners that parents and carers have an essential safeguarding role.
- Work with parents and partners to disrupt and bring perpetrators to justice.
- Influence national and local policy and practice to reflect the active safeguarding role of parents and the impact on families of child exploitation.
- Sustain long term change by training partners in the active role of parents and carers safeguarding their children

"PACE provide information, guidance and support workers to parents and carers who have concerns in any of these areas. Their <u>website</u> has a wealth of information and gives parents an opportunity to sign up for their parent newsletter and online parent forum.

"If you do have any concerns about issues of exploitation, we'd recommend you to contact PACE to access the support they can offer, or as always, feel free to contact us at <u>the usual address</u>".
